• Session 1C: Post-Secondary Coaching & The 4 C's to College Success – How and Why It Works (South Pavilion 5)

Chicago Scholars, a non-profit that provides an innovative college access, success, and leadership development program for Chicago's young leaders, will outline their community, relationship based, and technological model to address college persistence. Program strategies that have been implemented to achieve an 85% college persistence rate and 88% college graduation rate will be discussed.

The Center for the Study of Education Policy at Illinois State University will present research that analyzes post-secondary coaching in high schools, validating a successful cost-effective solution to overburdened high school counselors and over-reliance on academic interventions alone. In particular, coaches help disadvantaged students build social capital and gain access to key resources. Participants will receive a detailed description of coaches' work based on original case study research.

Participants will learn about barriers to college persistence and strategies to proactively prepare and address those barriers, including social emotional and innovative strategies to remain consistently connected to students.

Avoid costly mistakes – our Early Warning System in general education helps to keep students from race ending errors.

At Augustana College, Dominican University, and North Park University, the Associated Colleges of Illinois (ACI) Peer Mentoring Program helps at-risk students overcome social isolation and lack of familiarity with campus life, language, and culture to persist and complete degrees. This session illustrates how Peer Mentors reach beyond logistical support to promote personal transformations that change how students see themselves, academic achievement, social and family life. The program's components and outcomes will be reviewed.

The Illinois Board of Higher Education provides a grant to foster partnership between two and four year early childhood educator preparation programs. The Illinois Board of Higher Education will share the findings from an early implementation study of the grantees' efforts to develop options for seamless transfer, the attainment of stackable professional credentials, and degree completion in the field of early childhood.
