Free Application for Federal Student Aid

- The FAFSA is the application for federal student aid
- It is also used in many states for state aid
- Some institutions use it for institutional aid
- In Illinois, we also have the Alternative Application (for qualifying undocumented students)
- For this presentation, the term FAFSA is used for financial aid applications for federal and state financial aid programs





Need-Based Financial Aid Programs

- Most federal and state financial aid programs are needbased
 - Pell Grant \$7,395 (2023-24 maximum EFC \$6656)
 - Monetary Award Program (MAP) Grant \$7,200 (max. EFC ~\$9,000)
 - Federal Work-Study*
 - ► Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)*
 - Direct Subsidized Loans
- Need-based programs are awarded to students with high financial need (low-income)



^{*}Federal, need-based program that is only available at participating institutions



The FAFSA Simplification

- Yes, the FAFSA will experience a major overhaul
- Yes, it will have less questions
- No, I will not go into detail on those here
- Oh...and surprise!!! If you haven't heard, the FAFSA will become available in December (not October).



Our Students

- ► Illinois students receive an average of \$13,900 in federal student aid
- Class of 2022
 - ► 54.73% MAP eligible
 - ▶ 47.43% PELL eligible
 - > 30.60% Zero EFC



Why the FAFSA Matters

- Strong correlation between filing a FAFSA and enrollment
 - 2016-17 study: Low-income students who filed a FAFSA 127% more likely to enroll
 - ▶ 4.3% more likely to enroll at a 4-year institution
- Intended to help make college accessible and affordable
- Helps close the gap between what families can afford and cost of college
- Oh yeah, and it's a graduation requirement



The FAFSA Graduation Requirement

- Public Act 101-0180
- Effective 06/01/2020
- Students at IL public high school students must complete a FAFSA (or Alternative App) as a prerequisite to receiving a high school diploma



Unfunded Mandates

- Yes, they exist
- Yes, they are here to stay
- Focus on the impact and benefit for students
- Focus on what we <u>can</u> do



IL Graduation Requirements

- Language Arts 4 years
- Writing-Intensive 2 years
- Mathematics 3 years
- Computer Literacy 1 year
- Science 2 years
- Social Science 2 years
- Constitution Test
- Foreign Language 2 years
- Electives 1 year
- File a FAFSA (or Alternative App)
- State Assessment

One of these is not like the others





We Know the FAFSA Matters, But...

- It is the only graduation requirement completed outside of school hours
- ▶ It is treated differently from all other graduation requirements
- We don't think about it academically



Most Impact, Least Focus

- It is the only one that requires parents to take time off, even though it is a deciding factor for many students
- Takes the least amount of time to complete

The Problem

- It's an equity issue
- The FAFSA aims to provide an equitable opportunity to a postsecondary education, but why do we treat it like an extracurricular activity?
- We need to treat it with the same seriousness of other graduation requirements
- Without the FAFSA, do SAT or the constitution test really matter on their own?



Student & Family Barriers to the Extracurricular FAFSA

- Staying after school
- Access to internet or computer at home
- First-generation students may not know how to navigate processes
- Home responsibilities
- Transportation (bus, car, etc.)
- Other student priorities (tutoring, sports, ROTC, etc.)
- Availability time off from work or flexible schedule
- Other competing priorities (multiple jobs, younger children, etc.)



Inadvertent Messages to Our Students

- The FAFSA is important but not enough for the school day
- Stay after school or figure it out on your own
- Being low-income is no excuse
- If you really want to go to college, you'll find a way
- You have to persist and be resilient try harder!



Shared Responsibility

- Counselor caseloads are more than twice the recommended amount by ASCA (665:1 v. 250:1)
- The goal is not to add more work to counselors
- Make it everyone's responsibility to find a solution
- Extracurricular activities, usually have
 - Volunteer or additional pay
 - Budget for programming
- Spoiler alert: the FAFSA has neither of those



What You Can Do

- Encourage your administration to build the FAFSA into the school day
- Include it in senior seminar/advisory/division
- Partner with teachers to incorporate it into a lesson
 - It takes one class period
 - Computer literacy? Math?
- Excused absences for college visits can be combined with FAFSA Completion Workshops
- Reach out to ISAC for support
