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What is the Seal of Biliteracy?



The concept of the Seal of Biliteracy was started by Californians Together in 2008 in an effort to recognize the diverse language and cultural backgrounds of students. Now, 49 states and the District of Colombia have implemented state Seals of Biliteracy.

The Seal is an award given by a school or school district in recognition of students who have attained a high level of proficiency in English **and** an additional language by high school graduation.

It is tangible proof of language proficiency beyond just seeing a course on a transcript.

- Can be earned in more than one language
- Physical seal and designation on student's diploma and transcript
- Good for college credit at all public colleges and universities in Illinois




Seal candidates in YOUR schools...

 - * This is a GRADUATION award, but language development occurs before 12th grade!
 - * Can qualify with any scores or activities during grades 9-12

public school*





How does a student get the Seal?



Answer for students:

Your school awards the Seal of Biliteracy at graduation. The physical seal goes on your diploma and a note is made on your transcript.

During grades 9-12, demonstrate your proficiency in two languages. There are several methods to do so in English and Language #2

- Common methods for English proficiency: SAT, ACT, AP test, dual credit class, ACCESS for ELs (there's more!)
- Common methods for additional language: AP test, AAPPL or STAMP proficiency tests (there's more!)

Ask your teachers, counselors, principals for more info! Tell them to look it up on the ISBE website!

Answer for districts:

- 1. Establish culture of multilingualism and global competence in your schools!
- 2. Complete an application every year, before October 1. This is so you can submit award data (every year) after students graduate.
 - Public: Application and reporting in SIS (RCDT admin)
 - Non-public: email application and reporting docs (found on ISBE website) to <u>biliteracy@isbe.net</u>
- PUBLICIZE it's a requirement and you want to include as many students as possible.

One-pagers on our website

- Look into appropriate assessments for your groups of students. Keep all grades (9-12) in mind – scores from any time in high school can be used for the Seal.
- 5. CELEBRATE SUCCESSES in any way your school wants to! Yard signs, medals, certificates, local news paper, assembly...
- 6. Upon graduation, place seal on diploma and note on the student's official transcript.
- 7. Upload award results before Sept 15 of the next school year.

Minimum for a Commendation



Three Barriers to Multilingual Learners Participating in Seal of Biliteracy Testing

- Personalized information about the post-secondary benefits of earning a biliteracy recognition (college credits, tuition saved, job opportunities)
- Scheduling testing outside of the school day
- Cost of Exam AAPPL \$24 ALTA \$150+
- *SD129 Low-income students can apply for a fee waiver but must go through the application process
- Difficulty in locating information about the Seal of Biliteracy reciprocity at higher education institutions



Friday, May 13, 2022 ACCESS 2022 Preliminary Scores Received

- Population Data
 - 90 senior coded as EL on ACCESS 2022 score reporting
 - 36 seniors scored a 3.5 or higher on ACCESS 2.0 Literacy -
- 1 already earned a Seal of Biliteracy in Arabic







Efficacy Building Ingredients for Conversations

- **Self-efficacy** is our belief in our ability to achieve in the future based on experiences drawn from 4 sources (Bandura, 1997)
- Mastery Experience
 - You've already achieved (English score)
 - You are well positioned to score well in additional language

Verbal Persuasion

- Highlight achievement
- Explain significance of results and potential for saving time and money
- Build confidence in home experiences with additional language as valuable
- Activate parents to encourage students
 - Celebrate/validate their background and experience raising bilingual students <u>More on Self-Efficacy</u>

At the end of 2022, 156 total awards were given to West HS seniors (79 Seals & 77 Commendations)



8 students earned TWO seals (proficient in 3 languages)





6 Languages Represented: Arabic, French, Spanish, Romanian, Swahili, and Yoruba

2023 Results

- 57.9% increase in Biliteracy Distinctions (133 at 2022 Seal of Biliteracy ceremony to 210 in May 2023)
- 11 languages were represented in the class of 2023 including Spanish, French, Romanian, Swahili, Serbian, Mongolian, Yoruba, Bosnian, Farsi, Arabic, and Albanian.
- 260 students in the class of 2024 are partially qualified for Biliteracy Distinctions;
 40 students are <u>fully</u> qualified for a Biliteracy distinction in the class of 2024.
- **113 students** in the class of 2025, and **65 students** in the class of 2026.
- Students who earn a Seal of Biliteracy earn on average 12 credit hours from public colleges and universities. Students with a Commendation toward Biliteracy qualify for up to 9 credits at public colleges and universities in IL.

Funding option:

Title IV – A:

Supplemental assessments that qualify students for the State Seal of Biliteracy are allowable under Title IV-A.

Note: the Title IV-A grant has specific funding requirements (percentages of funding spent in 3 areas). The assessment would fall under Well-Rounded education area.



Course Credit for the Illinois State Seal of Biliteracy at Public Colleges and Universities in Illinois

Per Illinois state <u>statute</u>, "Each public community college and public university in this State shall establish criteria to translate a State Seal of Bilteracy into course credit based on foreign language course equivalencies identified by the community college's or university's faculty and staff and, upon request from an enrolled student, the community college or university shall award foreign language course credit to a student who has received a State Seal of Bilteracy. Students enrolled in a public community college or public university who have received a State Seal of Bilteracy must request course credit for their seal within 3 academic years after graduating from high school."

While the legislation requires that schools translate the Seal into course credit, many schools also use the Seal as a placement tool or to satisfy certain graduation requirements. It is the student's responsibility to seek these credits and approvals in a timely manner at the institution of higher education.

Chicago State University	A student who has received the Sate Seal of Biliteracy will be awarded a total of 6 credits (lower division). This is the equivalent of first semester (3 credits) and second semester (3 credits) of language study at CSU. When the seal is granted in a language not offered at Chicago State University, 6 credit hours of lower division foreign language elective will be awarded. Eastern Illinois University	A student who has received the State Seal of Biliteracy will receive a total of 8 credits (lower division). This is the equivalent of first semester (4 credits) and second semester (4 credits) of language study at EU.	Registrar: Biliteracy
Governors State University	Students who present appropriate documentation of the Seal to their advisor within three years of high school graduation will be awarded six hours of foreign language credit.	Admission Information
Illinois State University	Illinois State University accepts the State Seal of Biliteracy from any state as equivalent to two semesters (8 credits) of language study (LAN 111-112) in languages offered at the University. if the seal is granted in a language not offered at liftnois State University, eight credit hours of lower division foreign language will be awarded. 	If you are earning a B.S. in the Callege of Arts and Sciences, then your language requirement is to complete a world languages class of the level of 112 or higher, or completion of Level III of one high school world language or earning the Seal of Billeracy. ILLINOIS STATE SEAL OF BILITERACY

A public school district or nonpublic school may establish the State Seal of Billteracy program to recognize high school " graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in English and in one or more other foreign, or world, languages. This recognition must be designated on a student's transcript and high school diploma with or receipt of the State Seal of Billteracy, provided that all conditions and requirements for the program have been met.

The Illinois State Seal of Biliteracy



State Seal of Biliteracy

This is a program to recognize high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in English and in one or more other world languages. This recognition is designated on a student's transcript and high school diploma.

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS

English Proficiency (choose one)

- 1. ACCESS for ELLs: 4.8 composite
- 2. AP English Language and Composition exam: 4
- 3. ELA Dual Credit course
- 4. STAMPS 4S: Intermediate High
- 5. ACT: College ready benchmark (English) or 21 composite
- 6. AAPPL: I-5 (Intermediate High) (form B)
- 7. SAT: 480 ELA score
- 8. TOEFL: 85
- 9. TOEIC: 550

World Language Proficiency (choose one)

- 1. AP Language and Culture exam: 4
- 2. STAMP 4S: Intermediate High
- 3. AAPPL form B: 1-5 (Intermediate High)
- 4. ACTFL OPI + LPT + WPT + RPT: Intermediate High
- ALTA Speaking/Listening + Reading + Writing: 6 (Intermediate High)
- 6. NEWL: Intermediate High

All ISBE-approved tests require students to achieve <u>Intermediate High</u> (or equivalent) in **all four** domains: speaking, listening, reading, and writing.

More methods for demonstrating proficiency and other exams that are specific to certain languages can be found on our website and on our list of <u>approved assessments</u>.

Date	Activity
October 1, 2023	Application due in SIS. Must first enter at least one 11th-grade and one 12th- grade student as enrolled in SIS to access application.
No later than 45 days prior to awarding the Seal/Commendation	<u>Final</u> window to apply to the program.
September 15, 2024	SY 2023-24 final award data due in SIS.
