 - Session 1A: Accelerating Opportunity/Illinois Career Advancement Pathways System (I-CAPS) (South Pavilion 3)

The Accelerating Opportunity (AO) Initiative is a model program based on the Washington State I-BEST Model. AO strives to change the way Adult Basic Education is structured and delivered at the state and institutional levels focusing on transitioning more adults into post-secondary education and family-supporting careers. Illinois was one of only four states to receive implementation funding for AO, with eight community colleges participating in the Initiative. Each college has designed its programs around the required AO elements, while meeting its individual students' and community's needs. Five AO colleges will discuss their partnerships, comprehensive student supports, team teaching, integrated pathways, policies, and funding.

• Session 1C: The American Dream 2.0: How Leveraging Federal Financial Aid Can Improve Student Completion (South Pavilion 5)

While financial aid has had a strong and effective role in providing college access for students who qualify for assistance, this session will focus on the role of financial aid in advancing student success. Affordability remains a critical issue but so too does the number of students with debt and no degree. While the topic has been explored by many, the new national conversation is around leveraging federal financial aid to improve college access, affordability and completion. This panel presentation will advance the recent report, *The American Dream 2.0*, released by a national bi-partisan coalition recognizing the power of aid to serve as a completion tool and highlight the new Hart public opinion research about the latest concerns of the public, including Hispanic and African American parents, when it comes to issues of affordability, aid and transforming higher education.

• Session 2A: GED® or ESL Is Not Enough! CCC's Pathways from Adult Education to College and Career Programs (South Pavilion 3)

This session will highlight two City Colleges of Chicago (CCC) transition programs that are being taken to scale. The Gateway to the City Colleges of Chicago program encourages students to take some college credit courses at no cost while still enrolled in upper level ESL or GED classes, and continues to offer supports as they move completely to credit. The CCE Adult Education bridge programs transition low-skilled adults to college and careers in healthcare, logistics, and manufacturing. Participants in this session will leave with increased knowledge about the program structures and services of these two transition models that effectively serve the Adult Education student.

The six strategies were to address the issue of loss of students due to students and parents being unprepared and consequently unable to fulfill their financial obligations. Emphasis will be placed on the techniques that USFSCO uses to facilitate financial education through the Student Money Management Center on all 3 University of Illinois campuses. Introductory Mathematics courses at the college level are extremely challenging for many entering students. At Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, students' chances for success are being optimized by the Math Department's coordinated system across campus, which focuses on the first several weeks in a course and on a university campus. At Rock Valley College, Math Literacy for College Students, part of two national initiatives, AMATYC's New Life and Carnegie's Quantway, is providing an alternative, shorter pathway to college level math that is improving completion rates by using contextual lessons, problem solving and critical thinking.

Entering college is no guarantee that a student will continue to degree completion, so how do we define the factors that contribute to successful college completion? Research by the Illinois Education Research Council and ACT, Inc. indicates that when students are academically ready for college, achievement gaps are greatly narrowed for *all* students in college persistence and degree completion, especially among racial/ethnic and low-income groups.
